A MESSAGE FROM THE AMBASSADOR


Dear readers,
















NEWSLETTER

The Embassy's diplomatic section coordinates the bilateral relations between Switzerland and the Philippines across the political, economic and cultural domains.

Building on the previous year's milestone, the Swiss Innovation Prize 2024 was successfully held in November, celebrating excellence in sustainability, creativity, and innovation. The event brought together Filipino innovators and Swiss companies to showcase solutions that contribute to a more resilient and forward-looking future.





In the area of economic diplomacy, the Embassy works closely with the Swiss Chamber of Commerce of the Philippines (SwissCham) to promote trade and investment opportunities, strengthen business relations, and support Swiss companies operating in the country.

The Embassy also actively participates in business, trade and economic conferences. In October, Deputy Head of Mission, Hans-Christian Baumann, gave the opening speech at an IMF Conference on dept transparency, underscoring Switzerland's commitment to transparent, accountable and sustainable public finances.

Also in October this year, the Embassy welcomed a high-level Switzerland Tourism delegation that comprised of CEO Martin Nydegger, and other Swiss tourism partner destinations, underlining the potential of the Philippines as a market for Switzerland Tourism and further deepening cooperation in promoting tourism between the two countries.

The team remains actively engaged in monitoring human rights developments in the Philippines and continues to work closely with civil society, government, and international partners on initiatives that promote democracy, press freedom, and education. Through the small grants programme, the Embassy supports impactful local projects with a priority on peacebuilding, strengthening of democratic institutions, women's empowerment, rights of minorities and sustainability and innovation.

Looking ahead, the section will coordinate Switzerland's engagement with the Philippines during the Philippines' ASEAN Chairmanship in 2026.

OPENING OF AN HONORARY CONSULATE IN DAVAO CITY



Since August 2024, the embassy has had an honorary consulate in Davao City. Heinz Egli was appointed to this position by the Directorate of Resources of the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA). The embassy congratulates Mr. Egli on his appointment and looks forward to continuing the already fruitful and established collaboration.

The embassy also has an honorary consulate in Cebu.

Please note that honorary consulates do not have consular powers and therefore cannot issue Swiss visas or passports. Nor can they act as notaries or deal with civil status matters.

NATURAL HAZARDS

- The Philippines is prone to natural hazards such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, tsunamis, and typhoons. These phenomena can cause flooding, landslides, and significant damage to infrastructure. RETURNING TO SWITZERLAND AFTER A LONG PERIOD LIVING ABROAD?

- You also need to prepare your return to Switzerland carefully. Essentially, the process is similar to emigrating, which means you may need to deregister in your host country, complete customs formalities, find somewhere to live, register in your new place of residence, look for work, or join the social security scheme. ENTRY INTO SWITZERLAND

SCHENGEN VISA FOR THE FOREIGN SPOUSE OF A SWISS CITIZEN AND FOR THE MINOR CHILDREN OF THE FOREIGN SPOUSE

- Schengen visa applications (for stays of up to 90 days) must be submitted directly to the embassy and not to our external service provider VFS Global. An appointment is required to submit the application and must be requested in advance from the embassy by email.
- Information on Schengen visas for foreign spouses of Swiss citizens and for minor children of foreign spouses

ENTRY/EXIT SYSTEM (EES) FOR THIRD-COUNTRY NATIONALS ENTERING SWITZERLAND

- The Entry/Exit System (ESS) is a European database that electronically records the entries and exits of third-country nationals (e.g., Filipino nationals) crossing the external borders of the Schengen area. It replaces manual stamps in passports and stores travelers' biometric and biographical data. The aim is to enhance security, detect overstayers, and streamline border controls. The system is in Switzerland in operation since October 12, 2025. Further information is available in English, and will gradually be added in other languages, on the official website of the European Commission.

A recipe for those with a sweet tooth!

Carrot cake

30 minutes preparation time / 1 hour 25 minutes total time / 378 kcal per serving

For 12 pieces, you will need:

<u>Dough</u>

5 egg yolks

250 g sugar

250 g grated carrots

250 g ground almonds

1 organic lemon, grated zest and juice

80 g white flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

5 egg whites 1 pinch of salt

Here's how to do it:

Icing and topping

250 g powdered sugar

2 1/2 tablespoons kirsch or lemon juice

14 marzipan carrots

<u>Utensils</u>

For a springform pan approx. 24 cm in diameter, the

base lined with baking paper

Dough

Beat the sugar and egg yolks with an electric mixer for approx. 5 minutes. Add the carrots, almonds, and lemon to the mixture and stir. Mix the flour and baking powder and fold into the mixture.

Beat the egg whites with the salt and gently fold into the mixture with a rubber spatula. Pour the batter into the springform.

Baking

Bake for approx. 55 minutes in the lower part of an oven preheated to 180°C. Allow to cool slightly, then remove the edge of the pan. Place the cake on a wire rack and allow to cool.

Icing and topping

Mix the powdered sugar and kirsch well, pour into the center of the cake, spread over the top and sides using circular motions. Decorate with marzipan carrots and let dry.
